Action after two deaths

 Hundreds help raise money for memorial scholarship and push plans to close school campuses at lunchtime BY PATRICK WHITTIE

The joking and laughing in the crowd of about 300 people who filled D.S. Shanahan's, a sweltering Kings Park bar, belied the somber nature of vesterday's event: to show support for the families of two Smithtown High School West students who died in a car accident in October

As volunteers collected donations and sold T-shirts to help of Michael Western and Daniel Distefano, some supporters broke from the jocular mood to stump for proposed measures that would close high school campuses at lunch hour

Western and Distefano, both 17 at the time, died in Smithtown on Oct. 31 when they were thrown from a car driven by a friend on Jericho Turnpike during a school lunch break. State Assemb. Michael N. Gi-

anaris (D-Astoria) has presented a bill that would end student privileges to leave campus during lunch statewide, said his spokesman, John Puglisi, in a ties have been reported in the dents leaving campus during open campus" lunch hours. the statement said.

Ray Marchand, a close friend of the Western family who helped organize yesterday's event, said he is "all for" such a law. "I think your kid goes to school, you should know your kid's safe in school," Marchand said, adding that vesterday's event was expected to raise

Ed Wehrheim, a Smithtown town councilman, said he also supports closed campuses and urged the local school district

"Students are going to be rushing back to school. It's

something school boards have to look at," he said. Closed campus laws are not without detractors. More than 400 people have signed an online petition opposing a plan to close the Northport High

Deana Shanahan, owner of D.S. Shanahan's, said the law is worth it if it saves lives. 'Kids want their freedom. they want to have that adult feeling, but maybe it does become a safety issue," she said.

Oct. 31, 2007: Two Smithtown West High School students died in a lunchtime car accident: a third teen who was a passenger in Michael Western of Smithtown and Daniel Distefano of Nesconset, both 17, died after a car driven by Steven Badke, also 17, veered into oncoming traffic on Jericho

Turnpike, John Aruanno, 13. of Smithtown, a passenger in the van that collided with the teenagers' vehicle, died from his injuries

Sept. 9, 2005: Near the end of a lunchtime break at Jericho High School, Matthew Rayner of Jericho, 17, a senior, jumped onto the later died.
